Picture Books

Barracarro, Sal & Debra. **Adventures of Taxi Dog.** A stray dog in New York City is adopted by a taxi driver with whom he thereafter rides and shares adventures each day.

Brown, Marc. **Arthur's New Puppy.** Arthur's new puppy causes problems when it tears the living room apart, wets on everything, and refuses to wear a leash.

Catalanotto, Peter. **Daisy 1, 2, 3.** The resourceful Mrs. Tuttle teaches a Saturday dog obedience class to twenty Dalmations who are all named Daisy. Each has a unique attribute that makes it easy to tell them apart.

Feiffer, Jules. **Bark George.** Each time George's mother tells him to bark, he makes a different animal sound. So she takes him to the vet to find out what this puppy is up to.

Flack, Marjorie. **Angus and the Cat.** Angus the Scottie dog spends three days chasing the new cat that has come to live at his house, but when the cat disappears, Angus misses his new friend.

Hooper, Meredith. **Dog's Night.** Once a year, the dogs in paintings have a night to get out and exercise. They run up and down the grand staircases of the museums. One night, however, four dogs in one gallery groggily climb back up into the wrong paintings.

Hurd, Thatcher. **Art Dog.** By day he's Arthur, a mild-mannered museum guard. But at night, he becomes Art Dog, splashing the city with his own mile-high monsters and simmering sun-drenched scenes.

Lee, Chinium. **Good Dog, Paw!** When April the veterinarian treats animals in her office, her well-loved dog Paw helps her and lets her patients know the secret of good health.

Lipkind, William. **Finders Keepers.** Two dogs quarrel over ownership of a bone. They resolve their difficulties when an enemy threatens them both. 1952 Caldecott Award.

Meddaugh, Susan. **Martha Speaks.** Problems arise when Martha, the family dog, learns to speak after eating a bowl of alphabet soup.

Miller, Sarah Swan. **Three Stories You Can Read to Your Dog.** These stories are addressed to dogs and written from a dog's point of view, featuring such topics as 'barking at everyone on the other side of the door', to burying bones and running free.

Pilkey, Dav. **Dog Breath! the Horrible Trouble with Halley Tosis.** Halley the Tosis family dog, has such bad breath, that Mr. & Mrs. Tosis plan to give her away, until she proves to be an invaluable watchdog.

Rylant, Cynthia. **Henry and Mudge.** Henry, feeling lonely on a street with no children, finds companionship and love in a big dog named Mudge.

Cleary, Beverly. **Ribsy.** Separated from his owner in a shopping center parking lot, an ordinary city dog begins a series of bewildering adventures.

Crisp, Marty. **White Star: A Dog on the Titanic.** Twelve-year-old Sam, a passenger on the Titanic's maiden sea voyage, volunteers to help care for the dogs in the ocean liner's kennel and becomes fast friends with the Irish setter of J. Bruce Ismay, the ship's owner.

Finney, Patricia. **I, Jack.** Jack, a Labrador Retriever, tells about his daily life of food, walks, and the 'apedogs' and "funny-looking dogs" (cats) in his pack, as well as how everything changes when a pretty young dog moves into the neighborhood.

Hesse, Karen. **Sable.** Tate Marshall is delighted when a stray dog turns up in the yard one day, but Sable named for her dark silky fur, causes trouble with the neighbors and has to go.

Tamar, Erika. **The Junkyard Dog.** With the advice of her step-father, eleven-year-old Katie takes on the job of feeding an abused junkyard dog and building it a doghouse for shelter during the hard winter.

Taylor, Theodore. **The Trouble with Tuck.** When Helen's seeing eye dog goes blind, she realizes that it's her turn to help him after all the years of his faithful service to her. Based on true events of a girl and her dog's devotion and triumph.

Vande Velde, Vivian. **Smart Dog.** When Amy Prochenko, fifth-grade "dweeb" helps a talking dog escape from a research lab, she finds herself in deep trouble. Suddenly her life is full of danger and excitement as she finds the sort of friend she's always wanted.
